#### Jinance Committee Report

🖌 ellow Members,

It is with great pleasure that I report on the financial situation of our Club. In short, we are in good standing and all of our accounts are in order. I will provide more details, but first, I feel I should provide some background on where we were. The past year has been difficult, to say the least. A series of events brought us to our very lowest, and slowly, with the help of some very dedicated individuals, we are nearing a point that, at the very least, is what should be expected for a Club of our size. A lawsuit, an assessment, total depletion of our accounting staff, unhealthy practices, failed procedures, accounting deficiencies and little oversight were only some of the issues that had to be overcome.

Fast forward to this month's Finance meeting, and for the first time in months, we were presented with financial reports that will allow us to start making sound, fact -based financial decisions. Sandwiched in between was a Herculean effort by volunteers to write and rewrite our financial procedures; to track down accounts, make adjustments, pay Port Rent, make payroll, re-inventory everything, reconcile years' worth of mismanaged entries and rebuild our Accounting Staff. So, when we received the July report, in September, all of us on the Finance Committee and the Board were elated. We all recognize we have work to do.

The numbers are sound, but there are still things to clean up. The accounting can be better allocated to make our operations more efficient. We need to be briefed with reports that are 30 days old, not 60. But the skeletons are gone and the bones are solid. Our Accounting Department is in incredible hands. Our policies are protecting our assets and the oversight is following generally accepted accounting principles. We will continue to improve; we will be more transparent and we will provide numbers that make sense. In the coming weeks, the Finance Committee will be presented with proposals from Professional Investment firms to determine if our substantial Capital Reserves would be better served under their oversight.

We will be closing out 2020/21 and preparing to close out 2021/22. Once the latter is complete, we will get an Independent Review of our books for both fiscal years, that we will be able to provide to the membership for review. A Motion in November will propose an independent Comptroller, that will add another layer of oversight. We will continue to clean up the numbers and make adjustments to our allocations. We will be preparing next year's budget, based on sound inventory, better practices and reconciled accounting. So, in short, we are in good standing and all of our accounts are in order. I look forward to briefing you on more progress next Quarter.

The Muhl Family was well known in Coronado for many years as the owners of Muhl's Jewelers. **Kitty Muhl** was known as a very accomplished sailor but as a lady, she was not allowed to skipper the family boat in local races. She set out a deed of gift with a trophy in 1946 "to be competed for by the sailboat skipperetts".

In recent years, co-ed crews were welcome to participate but allfemale crews are given a bonus to the boat's sailing handicap. This year, 7 boats competed with 6 of them sailing with allfemale crews. The boats started and finished the 8-mile course in front of the clubhouse. Starting in very light wind was challenging, testing the patience of all aboard but once in South Bay, the wind picked up to a reasonable 6-8 knots. The boats com-

**Regarding Financial Management** 

YC Flag Members are welcomed to provide any feedback regarding House Rule changes. The following changes have been proposed by the Finance Committee in respect to the financial management of the club. If you have any comments or concerns that you would like to share on this subject manner, please email the Front Office at cycfrontoffice@coronadoyc.org.

The following changes to our House Rules are to better align our rules with the current forms of payment available in today's marketplace. It also adjusts the spending limits to better reflect what is currently encountered on a daily basis.

#### FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

1. Disbursements.

- A. Funds shall not be expended for non-budgeted items without prior authorization of the Board of Directors.
- B. Committee Chairs may authorize the expenditure of funds within their budgeted amounts without reference toauthorization of the Board of Directors.
- C. Expenses, which exceed budgeted amounts, will not be paid without Board approval.
- D. DChecks for disbursement of Club funds over the amount of \$2,500500 shall be-authorized in writingsigned by any two of the following: Commodore, Vice Commodore, Rear Commodore, Treasurer or General Manager on dPuty. The Club's ConstitutionBylaws charges the Treasurer with the responsibility for disbursement of Club funds and, if at all possible, he/she should be one of the two authorizerssigners. DisbursementsChecks under the amount of \$2,500500 mayshall require only one signature, and may be authorizedsigned in writing by any one of the following: Commodore, Vice Commodore, Rear Commodore, Treasurer or General-Manager on duty-and t-The Treasurer is charged with will-reviewing a detailed listing of all such disbursements.ingular authorizationsle signature checks.
- E. In a situation in which it is not reasonable to call a meeting of the Board of Directors, the <u>following unbudgeted expenditure limits apply: by the General Manager is authorized to make</u> <u>unbudgeted expenditures</u> not to exceed \$2,500500; <u>by both</u> the General Manager and Treasurer not to exceed \$3,000750; and <u>by both</u> the General Manager and Commodore not to exceed \$5,01,0000.

Result BOC is a non-profit, 501(c)(4), government advocacy organization led by <u>voluntee</u>r boating officers and directors from all over the state. They work with lawmakers to inform them of California boaters' needs and to protect and enhance the interests of the state's recreational boaters before the legislative and executive branches of state and local government and advocate boater positions on legislation and regulations.

RBOC conducts much of their business in Sacramento. Guidance from the well-respected lobbying firm of Desmond & Desmond is critical, consequently contributions from boaters and clubs throughout the State support these efforts. Unfortunately, contributions are not tax-deductible because RBOC's activities are considered political in nature. RBOC does *NOT* make contributions of any sort to legislators but rather relies upon its own persuasive abilities to steer legislation or seeks widespread help from the boating community to contact their own representatives to express an opinion.

RBOC was established in 1968 and their work in the past has included efforts to clean up California's coastal and bay waterways by not only mandating holding tanks, but promoted the building of pump out stations.

Another example, in 2020 the Governor's budget included a proposal for a 250% increase in boat registration fees. RBOC lobbied strenuously against that and in doing so was afforded some insight into the money trail. It was disappointing to observe that the \$60 million that funded Department of Boating and Waterways in 2012 had shrunk to \$5 million. The fee increase was removed from the budget. This year RBOC has succeeded in persuading legislators to modify bills that would have allowed boater's funds to be used to remove abandoned commercial vessels. And another bill that would have allowed rent control in California marinas was modified at RBOC's request to cover only permanent houseboats in San Francisco Bay.

RBOC also learned that boater's fees and taxes were being used for various parks projects including control of invasive weeds in the Sacramento delta and beach erosion. Engagement with Parks continues on these and other matters.

A wide variety of Legislation affects boaters and RBOC is determined to make sure that it is more to the benefit of boaters than to their detriment. We trust that boaters will contribute generously to that endeavor.

California yacht clubs and their members have been supporting RBOC financially for over fifty years. We are confident that they will continue to see the value in what RBOC does and that they will continue to support pro-boater legislative advocacy.



- Wet & Dry Slip holders are required to take their boat out twice a year to the Glorietta Bay buoy #1 as proof that vessels are seaworthy and functional. (once between January 1 - June 30, once between July 1 - December 31)
- Both the Co-owner Slip holder must complete an underway for each half of the year • Main Slip holder and Co-owner can complete an underway together
- Double slip fees will be applied if requirements are not met
