



The annual dues for all years after December 1, 2022, will be calculated by multiplying the applicable CPI-U percentage change by the previous year dues amount and adding the amount in US dollars, rounded up or down to the nearest dollar except where the amount ends in \$.50 in which case the amount will be rounded up to the nearest dollar, to the previous year's dues. Multiple Santa metal gauge to measure your lobsters, along with a Anas allowed all of us to enjoy stunningly beautiful conditions offshore, although the cooling waters have signaled the end of the season for warm water pelagic species. There is an abundance of bait right now, which has been a Siren's call for large marine mammals including seal lions, dolphins and whales. Mike and I have recently seen humpback whales out near the Coronado Islands, feeding on sardines and mackerel. While our iconic grey whales feed on amphipods off the ocean floor and the large blue whales feed on krill, the humpback and large fin whales often feed on schools of bait. With the lake-like conditions we have been experiencing, it is an excellent time to get out and see the abundance of life in the ocean.

But enough about whales, let's talk about fishing! Deep water fishing is in full swing offshore, with many tasty bottom dwellers eager to bite on squid or sardines. There are still some wary Yellowtail around, along with Swordfish moving into the Southern California Bight. All of these species require a trip offshore, but Mike and I would like to discuss local opportunities that are just beyond the Bridge. Halibut and bass are available in the Big Bay, and there is the added attraction of hooping for lobster. Lobster season is in full swing and these tasty crustaceans are readily available. Hooping for lobsters is a night-time event, requiring a modest investment in specialized equipment. More importantly, CDFW (California Department of Fish & Wildlife) has some strict regulations you must follow. The rules are simple, but you must comply. Complete lobster hoop setups are available at West Marine, Anglers' Choice and Squidco. The rigid metal hoop, mesh netting, floats and about 45 feet of line allow you access to most of the Bay's lobster haunts. A waterproof light (chem light or battery powered) is a must, and you cannot leave your hoops unattended. No more than 5 hoops per fisherman, with a maximum of 10 hoops per boat. Regulations require that your buoy float is labeled, and individuals must pull up their own hoops. If we have made this sound tedious, let us relate the excitement of pulling your hoop back up to the surface after soaking for 30 minutes or so on the bottom. It is almost a fishing Christmas present; you never know what you are going to catch. While you may occasionally get the odd ray or sand-shark, perhaps even a stray eel, you will more likely be rewarded with the hand-clapping sound of

S easons Greetings! We hope this Spiny lobsters slapping their tails as they try and get out of finds you all recovering from the the net. A steady, swift pull will pin the lobsters to the handout on the regulations for hooping.

> Hooping can be a pleasant social experience, although it can also be a bit wet and messy. The bait is generally fish heads or cleaned carcasses, and the haul up can be a wet experience. Heidi and Karin have perfected the art of supervision with wine and hors-d oeuvres, while Mike and I do the driving and hauling. After setting your hoops, there is generally a 30 - 45 minute reprieve while you wait for the bait to attract lobsters. Plenty of time to relax and refresh! And the payoff of fresh lobster tail on the grill is unparalleled. Fishing a rising tide tends to produce better results, but make sure you get out there before the sun goes down. You will be surprised how many people pursue these tasty creatures in the Bay.

<u> The</u> Yacht Wind Spirit –

Crossing the Atlantic & Cruising the Western Med

s I mentioned before, the Yacht Wind Spirit was an ocean cruiser. **Bob**, a capable captain and navigator, Raye, a capable first mate, and all they needed was crew. Soon, they met 2 adventuresome, healthy young ladies who volunteered, and they were set.

You don't sail east into the Trades. You sail due north to Bermuda to get to the Westerlies and the Gulf Stream. This is an almost 1000 mile jaunt right through the nefarious Bermuda Triangle with a starboard tack beam reach in the trades My wife **Peggy** was a flight attendant and had made trips to shifting to port tack when you get the Westerlies.

Celestial Navigation in a steady aircraft is a lot easier than on a pitching boat, but never-the-less **Bob** found the lonely islands and they completed the first leg. Unfortunately, or fortunately, whichever way you call it, on arrival in Bermuda the two young ladies had had enough and jumped ship. The next leg of a couple thousand miles to the Azores could not be done just double handed, so a call for crew was meaning. Of Course, being stuck in Bermuda isn't so terrible, but of course getting to the La Maddelena in the Med was a long way and you needed to get there before the bad weather sets in.

Fortunately, **Peggy** and **I** chanced on a young fellow who had some experience sailing and was game. We flew him to Bermuda so "Wind Spirit" had a crew of three, a bit thin for the crossing but two months had gone by and it was time to go. So they went with the Westerlies on their stern and about a one knot of Gulf Stream under them. The course was a hair north of east and I suspect the autopilot did a lot of work, but still you have to have a look out and stand watches and fix and eat meals and sleep.

I don't recall how long it took, probably close to 3 weeks, but they were darn glad to raize Horta and get some rest. They enjoyed their brief stay, but they needed to be on their way to Gibraltar another 1000 mile leg of open ocean. Once they got to the Med they would be met by son Bobby and his wife for the leg to La Maddelena. Oddly enough, this leg was to give them the biggest scare of the trip. Approaching Ibiza, westernmost of the Balearic Islands in the Western Med. while on a beautiful sunny day they were struck by a rogue wave without warning. Water poured into the cockpit and then the open hatch to down below. Bobby's wife was thrown over the side, but was able to catch the swim ladder and hold on and be recovered. A miracle. And to think it was



such a pretty day. Bobby was about to take a picture of the crew in the cockpit before the incident recurred.

Europe and was anxious to vacation there. My mother, age 80 had just married a retired Art History professor, who had spent a lot of time in Italy and whose first wife was Italian. He was anxious to take mother to Italy while they were still able. So it was then we planned my first trip to Europe with our first stop a coastal town on the French border, Hayden's Italian place, Ventimiglia. Then we proceeded to Genoa, Pisa, and Florence with our art expert to show us the way. At the end, we were to leave there and take the ferry from Leghorn to Sardinia and meet the boat at La Maddelena. La Maddalena, besides having a US Naval Base, is a summer resort for tourists, it was October, and the tourists were gone but we found no boat as we were a couple days early of their ETA. No problem, we enjoyed a couple day's rest in a nice hotel and with good restaurants about. The boat arrived on schedule and was moored among the fishing fleet in the small harbor. Bob & Raye gave a huge sigh of relief to reach their destination. 


